Ashwin Bedi had begun organising a party for his mother, Sudesh Bedi's 75th birthday when she sadly passed away from cancer on 26th August 2008.

Ashwin decided he would still go ahead with the party, in March 2009, but make it a dinner dance in memorial of his mother. Calling on all of his contacts and networks, Ashwin

organised an amazing event. The night included an auction and raffle, raising over £29,000 for Cancer Research UK.

This year, to mark the second anniversary of Sudesh's passing, Ashwin held another dinner dance, raising another astonishing £28,000. This time his auction and 'anonymous' raffle included prizes of recording studio

sessions, four tickets to a Spurs training session and a football signed by the Arsenal football team.

Ashwin is planning his next event for March 2012 and on the advice of some of his guests, will be aiming much higher!

'Charity 16' for a Third Year Running!



Youth Worker and football coach Russ Wilson organised his third annual 'Charity 16' race in Buntingford in September. Russ conceived the idea to raise the profile of young people who take an active part in the community and to bridge the gap between generations. Russ had also experienced cancer in his own family.

'Charity 16' takes its name from the total distance traversed by entrants in a triathlon style format, with a five mile run, a ten mile cycle ride and a mile swim. Fifteen entrants, with ages ranging from 16 to 49, completed all three stages. Nine further entrants competed in one or two stages, all making donations to or raising sponsorship for the charity. The event was won by Tom Dalden with Mr Wilson himself, pictured here, finishing in second place.

The event is traditionally family orientated with Mr Wilson's own step-son Jack joining him. This time he was supported by a strong team of volunteers, some of whom travelled from as far as Reading, who marshaled the races, recorded times and provided refreshment and encouragement.

Mr. Wilson has raised £6,700 in the past two years through 'Charity 16' and hopes to raise at least £2,000 this year. He would like to thank Buntingford Cricket Club who made their facilities available to the triathletes, and who also donated the proceeds from the bar to the fund.

Local Supporter Conference Success

Our Local Supporter Conferences in September and October, were opportunities for some of our valued supporters to meet other fundraisers like themselves from other fundraising groups and initiatives in their area. The meetings worked well as a time for sharing ideas and successes and for discussing new ideas for the future. The conferences were also a chance to say 'Thank You', to some of those who make Cancer Research UK's life saving work possible.

Those lucky enough to be able to attend either of the Local Supporter Conferences were treated to a talk from one of two scientists working in the local area and whose work is directly involved with Cancer Research UK.

At the conference in Reading, preconceptions of the role of a Plastic Surgeon were turned upside down as Mr Milap Rughani, Plastic Surgery Registrar & Clinical Research Fellow at Oxford Biomedical Research Centre, spoke about his role as a Plastic Surgeon and Melanoma.

Supporters at the Milton Keynes Conference were given a fascinating talk by Professor Mike Hawkins, Chair of Epidemiology and Director of the Centre for Childhood Cancer Survivor Studies. He explained how, with his team, he examines years worth of data from people diagnosed with cancer as children to see if the cancer/treatment received has an impact on their future health and lives.

Our Local Progress...

The Role of Plastic Surgery in Melanoma



The term 'plastic surgery' is associated with Hollywood and facelifts! However the majority of plastic surgery operations treat cancer, accidents or congenital deformity. Melanoma is cancer of the skin and is the fastest growing cancer in young adults. It is unpredictable and can spread to other organs. Patients with widespread melanoma have few proven treatments available. Therefore the principle treatment is surgery.

Plastic surgeons work within multidisciplinary teams in managing melanoma. We see patients with suspicious moles and once melanoma is diagnosed, we excise the cancer and surrounding skin. Plastic surgeons employ various techniques including moving local areas of skin (flaps) or transporting new skin (grafts) to reconstruct the surgical defect.

Additional surgery to detect the spread of melanoma via the lymph glands (sentinel node biopsy) is also performed. If positive, all lymph glands in the area are removed at a further plastic surgery operation (block dissection). Our on going research aims to predict pathways in the spread of melanoma. If we are successful, we can identify patients at higher risk of melanoma spread and offer earlier treatment.






Volunteering in the community
